



# How to pick the right color for your shingle

The right color and style of roofing shingles will make a great first impression from the front of your home and potentially boosting its resale value.

#### Coordinate with Siding and Shutters

Interior designers don't just randomly pick pretty colors for flooring, cabinets, countertops and walls without regard to the big picture.

All colors must work together to achieve a whole that is visually coordinated and appealing.

The same is true for your home's exterior. First, the roof color should be dissimilar enough to provide contrast.

A dark brown roof would be boring with wood siding stained dark. Brown shingles would work with beige siding, a mild contrast, or with white, a more distinct contrast.

Also, when the roof color picks up tones in window shutters, the front door or accent trim, it nicely ties together the exterior look.

#### **Know When to Use Color Blends**

Asphalt shingle lines are produced in solid colors and blends. For example, CertainTeed Landmark shingles in Hunter Green show no variation. They're just deep green.



By contrast, Landmark Heather Blend shingles are a mix of several brown tones and rust too.



Owens Corning Duration Designer shingles in multiple blends are even more varied



Now, here's the blending principle: The plainer the siding is, the more a blended color pattern is needed to make your home look interesting and appealing. A solid black roof on a home with dark brown wood siding creates a boring combination.

On the other hand, if your home's siding is varied – perhaps brick featuring multiple shades or an elegant stone front with varied colors – then color-blended shingles with clash.

Here's an example of Landmark Driftwood shingles that fail in this regard. The result is a busy clash. The colors aren't coordinated either.



The stone veneer on the house above is arguably quite busy, and so is the roof. The plain white color on the rest of the house helps to balance the appearance, though.

# Achieve Visual Balance with Light or Dark Shingles

Did you know? Dark colors draw more attention than light colors do. You can apply this principle to your shingle color choice to give your home the desired balance in its appearance.

Multi-level homes often feature darker shingles to make the roof look more substantial in order to balance the height of the house.



Dark shingles can make a single-story home appear to be "all roof" (photo on top of page), especially if it is a tall, steeply pitched roof or a hip roof.

This roof threatens to dominate the home, though it does make the dormers "pop" visually (second photo).

Light-colored shingles atop a two-story can look out of balance too, especially if the roof has a lower pitch such as 4/12 or 6/12.






One design concept that applies across all is this - objects that are darker in color appear smaller and recede in space, and objects that are lighter in color appear large and seem closer.

Dark colors works very well for mondern houses and sloped roofs since the idea is draw attention for big windows.

There are many colors gray/black roofs work well with: varieties of off-white, gray, blue, gray-green, yellow, blue and pastel.



# Complement your Home's Architecture and Setting

Some home styles demand a certain "look" for the roof. Stately, traditional homes are roofed in black or very dark blends consistent with their grand appearance.

Rusty reds and oranges, the colors of traditional clay tiles, are ideal for homes with a Southwest or Floridian flare, perhaps sided in stucco.

A wood-sided home set among trees blends best with its surroundings when deep forest green shingles or a green/brown blend are used.

A white beach house with red trimtopped by a blue roof completes the nautical theme.

Those are just a few examples of how a home's style and setting influences roof color.

# Be Consistent with Neighborhood Standards

For home-selling purposes, it's not a good idea to have the most unique house in the neighborhood. Choose a color or blend consistent with what others in your area are using. This is especially true when homes are close together, near the road and/or have few large trees in front or around them.

Is there a homeowner's association in your neighborhood? If so, check the bylaws regarding exterior home colors. Some rules are very strict.

#### Consider Climate Characteristics

Dark colors absorb heat, and light colors reflect it. While the best protection against heat loss and gain in your home is sufficient insulation, the color of the shingles can affect attic temperatures by 40 degrees. Dark shingles are better suited to cool climates because the extra heat facilitates melting of snow and ice.

Lighter shingles help keep AC bills under control in warm climates, especially those with plenty of sunshine too.

# Get Samples and Try Them with Siding and Trim

## **Home Guide: Top Exterior Siding Options**

More than just a protective barrier, home siding can make your home aesthetically appealing. Whether you are building a new home or upgrading an existing residence, there are many home siding options available. But first, you have to consider what type of exterior siding is best for you and your home.

#### What is Home Siding?

Siding is the layer of material placed on the exposed area of a house. Typically, siding is made of wood, stone, brick, stucco, metal, or synthetic materials.

#### **Siding Checklist**

Before making a decision about home siding options, you should first think about your requirements and the reasons why you should choose a specific type of siding.

**Restrictions**: You may live in a historic district that has strict rules about siding. If you're part of a homeowner's association, you may be prohibited from using certain exterior cladding materials and colors.

Climate: Your choice of siding may depend on climate. Conditions like blizzards, hurricanes, high humidity and salty air can decrease the longevity of your siding. House Style: The architectural style of your house may dictate what siding is suitable. Many older homes were originally sided with wood planks. Fortunately, it's easy today to maintain the character of your house without straying too far from the original design. You can find all forms of siding that are made to look like traditional wood lap siding, cedar shakes or stone.

**Budget:** The price of home siding varies according to the material. Stucco is one of the most expensive options because of the three-coat application process, while vinyl is more reasonably priced. You need to do some research to find an affordable siding that meets your criteria.



Maintenance: Your choice of exterior siding will depend on the degree to which you want to deal with the hassle and expense of frequently caring for your siding. Wood siding will require staining or painting and stucco may also need repainting. In addition, wood siding is susceptible to wood boring insects and rot. Brick siding, on the other hand, may last approximately 100 to 200 years, though it may also start to deteriorate at the mortar joints.





# New Trends and Popular Siding

There are many different exterior home siding options, especially with modern house design. One trend occurring now is focusing on using more than one type of siding and style of cladding on a house. This may be done by blending varying widths of siding or incorporating various styles together, such as shiplap with cedar shingles in the same color. Instead of brick and stone being used to cover an entire house, it's used along with other materials to create interesting architectural detail.

## Gutters | Variety of style, colors and materials

Gutters are a core component for the day-to-day function of your home. By channeling rainwater away from the structure of the home to designated drainage areas, prevent several issues

#### **Types of Gutters**

The most popular gutter styles are K-style and half-round gutters, but there are a couple of other types of gutters to know. Let's take a closer look at each kind below.

#### **Half-Round Gutters**

These gutters feature a semicircular design and a curved lip. Due to the rounded design, they feature round downspouts. Half-round gutters come in 5-inch and 6-inch widths. Many homes built before 1960 feature this style, so these gutters work well if your home is historic or brick. In fact, local ordinances may require you to have this type of gutter if your home is historic or in a historic neighborhood.





#### K-Style Gutters

K-style gutters are the most common style of gutter, and they're also suited for DIY installation. Like half-round gutters, K-style gutters come in 5-inch to 6-inch widths, but they tend to rectangular downspouts. Due to their flat backs, you can nail K-style gutters directly to your fascia boards without brackets. However, cleaning K-style gutters is more challenging than other gutters because their inner angles collect a lot of debris.



#### **Box-Style Gutters**

Commercial or industrial buildings often feature box-style gutters, but a professional can tailor them to residential homes. Box gutters are oversized and designed to handle heavy rainfall. This gutter style comes in 7-inch and 8-inch widths, and some come as large as 10-inches wide. Due to their size, you will need a larger roof to install them.

Also, unlike other gutters, box gutters are not hung on your roof's edge. Instead, they use a high back section that tucks under a roof's shingles. Due to this, box gutters must be installed while your home is being built.

#### **Custom Fascia Gutters**

These are custom-built gutters that provide a seamless, contemporary look. Fascia gutters need to be installed by a professional who will work with you to create a custom-built system made of one long piece of aluminum. The aluminum piece is tailor-made according to your home's measurements and roof's pitch. Be aware that you'll most likely pay twice as much for fascia gutters as half-round or K-style gutters.





## **Understanding a Gutter System**

Below, we've defined some of the core components and concepts of a home's gutter system. This overview will help you better understand the gutter's design and its role in protecting your home.

- **Downspout**: This vertical pipe carries rainwater from the gutters down to a drain or the ground.
- **Drainage**: This refers to a system of gutters and drainpipes that carry rainwater away from your home's siding and foundation.
- Fascia board: This flat board runs horizontally along the edge of your roof. It tends to cap the ends of your roof rafters to provide a more finished look. Fascia boards also provide a base for attaching gutters.
- Hanger: This is a metal bracket installed on the fascia board to secure the horizontal gutter section.
- Pitch: This is the angle at which a horizontal section of the gutter is tilted. This angle forces rainwater to flow towards a downspout and is crucial to proper gutter function.



- Seams: Many gutter designs have seams where individual lengths of gutter connect. During installation and routine maintenance, you must apply a gutter sealant to prevent these seams from leaking water.
- Splash block: This plastic or concrete surface is placed under a downspout to direct water away from your home, avoiding pooling around the foundation and possible trenching during heavy downpours.



### **Gutters Materials**

Gutters are made of various materials, with vinyl and aluminum being the two most popular options.

#### **Vinyl Gutters**

These are the most common types of gutters. Vinyl gutters are easy to install, making them a common choice for DIYers. Made from plastics and PVC, vinyl gutters are not durable and have an average lifespan of 10 to 20 years. Be aware that vinyl gutters tend to deteriorate faster in wetter climates. If your home is in a location with wet weather conditions, you may want to consider a metal gutter, such as steel or copper.





#### **Galvanized Steel Gutters**

Galvanized steel gutters are more durable and sturdy than aluminum gutters, but they require professional installation due to their need for soldering. These gutters are ideal for homes that experience heavy rainfall and wet weather. They last 20 to 30 years but may rust if not correctly maintained.

#### **Aluminum Gutters**

Another great option for DIYers, aluminum gutters are lightweight and rust-resistant. They have an average lifespan of 20 to 30 years, but they're at a higher risk of cracking than other metal gutters.



#### **Copper Gutters**

Copper gutters are very durable. They do not warp, bend, or rust in extreme weather conditions. They also give your home a unique look with a beautiful shine and traditional style. However, copper gutters tend to be the most expensive option and require professional installation.



#### **Stainless-still Gutters**

Stainless-steel gutters are strong and rust-free, and maintain their high sheen for years. But as with other high-end custom materials, the drawback is cost: about \$20 per linear foot. For this reason, galvanized-steel, aluminum or vinyl gutters are the predominant varieties.

#### **Zinc Gutters**

Pre-weathered zinc gutters are one of the most low-maintenance gutter options. These gutters are rust-resistant and use a self-sealing patina to avoid the formation of any scratches or cracks. Because zinc gutters are so sturdy, you avoid paying for more gutter repairs or replacements during their average 80-year lifespan.







# 6 Tips for Choosing the Right Gutter Color for Your Home

#### 1- Choose the same match color

We recommend choosing a color that is the same as your siding, the same as your trim, or the same as your roof. Matching gutter color to siding color is usually the safest choice and it will blend in with your home.

# 2- Black or dark-colored gutters will generally look better longer.

Light colors will show stains and debris like splashed up mud, grass clippings, or mulch particles. If you want the low-maintenance option, go for something darker.

# 3- If you can't decide, think about what color you would paint the garage.

For exemplo stone and brick homes can be especially difficult to choose a gutter color. We like to say, whatever color you paint your garage or would paint your garage is the one you should go with.

#### 4- Consult your HOA or neighbors.

If you have an HOA, it is important to check with them to see if there are any restrictions on what color gutters you can have.

5- Go bold. Though the most common choice is to have your gutters blend in with the rest of the home, you can always go bold if that is more your style. If you want to use the gutters as a contrasting design element, pick a complementary shade that's either much darker or lighter than the colors on your home's siding, roof, or trim.

#### 6- Don't forget about the budget.

If you are on a tight budget, white and offwhite are the basic factory finishes and they look great on houses too. Don't feel like you have to spend more money here if it is not in the budget.



## **Gutters | Leaf Guards**

Leaf guards, gutter covers, gutter helmets, gutter guards. They are called many things, but they all have the same goals: reduce maintenance and keep gunk out of your gutters.

#### **Types of Gutters Guards**

#### **Bottle Brush Guards**

Firstly, one of the cheapest options and easy to install, bottle brush guards look like elongated bottle brushes that sit inside of your gutter system. They are meant to allow water to flow easily through the bristles while keeping debris out. While these are a simple, quick, inexpensive solution, the brush material itself can quickly clog with small debris. Unfortunately, there is no easy way to clean them out. Also, many homeowners with this option also find that they can deteriorate quickly over time.





#### **Foam Gutter Guards**

foam guards look like a long, dense, triangular piece of foam that easily slides into your gutter system. They come in various sizes and are designed to allow the water to flow through the foam into the gutters while filtering out any debris. Most are made from polyether plastic material. While inexpensive, these, unfortunately, have similar performance issues to the bottle brush guards.



#### Vinyl & Plastic Gutter Guards

Plastic or vinyl guards are long grates that snap into the gutter system. These are popular DIY options among homeowners for multiple reasons. Firstly, you can install them yourself. Secondly, they are much cheaper than metal gutter covers. Lastly, they perform better than foam or bottle brush gutter inserts since they have a similar design to professionally installed guards.

The downsides? These gutter covers are plastic. Consequently, they can warp, bend, and break easily from high heat, built-up debris, and strong winds. As a result, they have a shorter shelf-life. Additionally, since they break easily, it is not easy to remove and reinstall them during cleaning without damaging them. Lastly, if you ever need to hire a roofing, siding, or painting contractor, these plastic guards can easily get in the way of those projects for the technicians



#### Perforated Gutter Guards

Perforated guards are most commonly made from aluminum. They are long sheets of metal (flat or wavy) with perforated holes in them to allow water to flow through. Typically, these guards sit inside the gutter system and attach to the gutters themselves. In most instances, you need to hire a professional to install these since it is a more complex installation. Since the guards are aluminum—the same material as most gutter systems—they cannot rust. Additionally, they keep medium and large debris out of your system while allowing water to come through. If you have a lot of pine straw or tiny debris, then it could still get into your gutter system. However, with heavy enough rain, a lot of that can still wash out of your gutters and through your downspouts. In regards to maintenance, perforated gutters need a basic gutter blow-off once or twice a year depending on your tree coverage. If you live in a windy area, sometimes the wind even takes care of this for you.



#### Reverse-Curve Gutter Guards

Reverse-curve guards act as a covering over your gutter system with a slotted opening at the end for water to enter your gutter system. Ultimately, the idea behind this is that any debris will slide off your gutter covers onto the ground while allowing the water to slide into the gutters and drain properly.

Unfortunately, is one major downside to these types of coverings. If you have a steep roof where a lot of water runoff leads to one point, there may be too much momentum for the water to slide into your gutters. Instead, the water will shoot over your gutters onto the ground.



#### Micro-Mesh Gutter Guards

Micro-mesh guards are composed of a fine mesh typically with a metal structural backing. The fine mesh can filter out even the smallest debris like pine straw and shingle granules. These are an excellent option for homes with heavy tree coverage. Since these are a more premium product, they are one of the more expensive options, and they do require a professional installation. Like most gutter inserts, while they significantly reduce maintenance, they do need to be blown off every so often to prevent any build-up on top of the guards. No gutter guards are 100% maintenance-free, despite what advertisements say.

If you want micro-mesh gutter guards, be sure to choose a brand that has a solid frame so the mesh is sturdy and won't bend in like vinyl gutter guards.





#### YOU SHOULD REPLACE YOUR ROOF BEFORE IT'S TOO LATE

Don't wait for an emergency, get ahead of any potential problems and replace your roof before the end of its life.

The roof of your home is one of the most important parts of your property and replacing it with a brand-new one can be done for aesthetic reasons, safety reasons, or because your current roof is not up to code and needs to be replaced.

But what happens when you don't replace a roof in time? It's simple: you put yourself and your property at risk. The consequence are compromise your home structure, ultimately leading to full collapse.
